

Mission for the Month: Scouts by Roger Burdett

The Cub open day in January has proved to be a watershed moment for the Group with an encouraging big jump in numbers in the young section and engagement from new families and parents. We are striving to sustain a fun, interesting and challenging programme for them and their first camp is this month ($7^{th}/8^{th}$ June).



The Scout section, although very small, is perhaps the more challenging both in addressing their varied personalities and providing an age-related exciting programme; at the same time being unable to afford any great expense either by the Group or parents. Vicar's thought

I was chatting with someone recently about how we only notice certain things when they have a direct connection to us. So, we recently bought a new car, a Citreon Picasso, and since then I've noticed other Citreon Picassos on the road in a way I didn't before. Similar with advertising: it seems to me we normally only notice advertising when we are seeking a product like the one which is being advertised, if not then adverts will normally wash over us (unless they have a very catchy jingle!).

It can be like that with the question of politics. I mention this subject because of the sudden announcement of the General Election in recent days. We can feel detached from government and politics when we feel it doesn't really affect our lives. But when it does, we are more likely to notice. When that friend is having to wait a very, very long time for an operation - maybe then we think about it. Or when the prices in the supermarket go up a lot, maybe then we notice and start to ask the question 'why?'.

But however engaged or not you feel about politics, in the run up to the next general election please remember that we must always approach it with the good of our neighbours in mind....in line with Jesus' teaching that to love our neighbour is the second greatest commandment after loving God. If we vote (whoever we vote for), we should do so not simply for our own good, but for the good of others in our society (all of them!), and as part of our worship to God. To quote Jesus: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' (Matthew 22: 39b, NIV)
