Mission of the month Tearfund

Tearfund have launched an **Emergency Appeal** for the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC).

People are running for their lives to escape violent conflict in the DRC. Decades of fighting have left millions of people without safe homes. Now, they're being forced to flee again.

Recently attacks in the city of Goma forced hundreds of thousands of innocent people to leave the area. Some 3,000 people have been killed, and 2,800 have been injured.

Families who've already lost their homes are terrified, and their lives are in danger. Carrying their belongings, they're seeking shelter in temporary camps, schools and churches.

In an already desperate conflict, the humanitarian need is growing. Clean water is hard to come by. Hospitals are overwhelmed. Banks are closed. Places that should be safe are under attack.

Tearfund staff and partners in the DRC are working right now to distribute clean water, personal hygiene supplies and emergency cash so people can buy food.

Vicar's Comment

I had an interesting conversation with someone not so long ago about prayer. This person is involved in mission work overseas. Basically, they shared with me that when it comes to witnessing to people of another faith, they don't suggest to that person 'shall we pray?' but they instead say 'shall we talk to God about this?' The reason for this is that in their culture, the idea of prayer involves a very ritualistic practice of prayer which is quite different to a form of conversational prayer which Christians might be familiar with. But to instead say 'shall we talk to God?' bypasses the idea of that very ritualistic approach.

This is a story from overseas mission, but I think it's a challenge to us as well. Has the word 'prayer' even in our context become synonymous with a very cultural understanding of what prayer is? Because essentially, at its core, verbal prayer is talking to God. I think it would be an interesting experiment in our church's life to replace the word 'prayer' and replace it with 'talking to God' and to see if the change feels jarring, and if it does - why?

One of the weeks in the current preaching series 'Following Jesus, Being Church', was focussed on prayer, specifically, the need to be a praying community. That is, the need to be a community that talks to God. And what should we talk to God about? Well here's one verse to be getting on with from the book of Philippians: 'in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God'. Philippians 4: 6b (NIV)
